

Dear Parishioners,

I hope you are all bearing up well as we continue to observe the Covid - 19 restrictions. Once again a word of encouragement to keep doing so. It does make a difference and as Christians who often proclaim our pro life credentials we have a responsibility to do everything to safeguard the lives of others especially the most vulnerable among us. To those faithfully cocooning a special word of thanks. You are a great example of respect and solidarity with your sisters and brothers in the community. As a Church community we have had to let go of so much these days but in a greater sense this letting go is itself a greater witness to the Love of God and a Eucharistic solidarity with so many people. However there are still many aspects of Church life that continue albeit in a new way. Our parish office may be closed but remember that doesn't mean that we are not open! This Sunday's Gospel story is so appropriate in this regard. Closed doors didn't stop Jesus from coming to his fear stricken disciples bringing them Peace and giving them the Holy Spirt to bring God's Gift of Mercy to the world. The risen Christ opened up new paths for them to witness to his resurrection. So too for us - closed doors must not prevent us from welcoming Christ and still witnessing to him. It brings to mind the words of Bishop Farrell at the beginning of this 'lockdown' "Many events have been cancelled because of the Coronavirus. Faith, love, and especially hope, however, are not among them". So our mission continues & don't forget to call us if you need anything even for a chat! This second Sunday of Easter is dedicated to Divine Mercy.

Even though we celebrate the Feast of Divine Mercy this weekend our commemoration of Good Friday just a short few days ago expresses in a profound way what the Mercy of God is. On the Cross Jesus gave his life for all of us. It was an outpouring of Love and Mercy which brings salvation to all people. As a result of this outpouring of God's Mercy we can never be discouraged by our own sins or the sins of others. The feast of Divine Mercy is truly an invitation to believe that no human being is beyond the Love and Mercy of God. We are called to put this belief into action by being 'Merciful like the Father' which reminds us of the theme of the 'Year of Mercy' instituted by Pope Francis during 2015- 2016. If we really want to be apostles of Divine Mercy we must see all our sisters and brothers on the face of the earth, and indeed all creation as redeemable. God is never found wanting in Mercy. Neither should we be found wanting when it comes to being merciful to others.

The pages of the Gospel draws our attention to the Mercy of God too. In a special way the parables of Jesus such as the story of the 'Prodigal Son' ... (Luke 15:11-32) beautifully describe the unconditional Love and Mercy that is gifted to us. The gospel accounts of the Life, Death and Resurrection of Jesus and the continuation of his mission given him by the Father, through the power of the Holy Spirit working though the Church give us reassurance that the river of Mercy never runs dry.

In these days of the Covid - 19 pandemic we see many examples of mercy in our world; in hospitals, care centres, community groups, sports clubs, parishes, simple acts of kindness and compassion. Mercy has come to mean observation of the current restrictions & cocooning as a mark of their respect and care for others, putting their needs at the centre. This is a great sign of hope. It shows we are capable of Mercy, that maybe people have taken on board the essence of the message of the Gospel more than we ever thought. For us as Christians acts of mercy and compassion are an expression of thanksgiving for the Mercy we have received. The Church will never be irrelevant or redundant as long as we are willing to proclaim the Gospel of Mercy.

The Celebration of Funerals

As we reflect on Divine Mercy we recall that one of the works of mercy has always been to bury the dead. Unfortunately in these days the nature of our funerals has changed. Due to the Covid - 19 restrictions families are unable to gather as they would have traditionally done with extended family and friends. Since the restrictions have come into place funerals have been celebrated in Ferrybank and Slieverue in accordance with HSE regulations endorsed by the Diocese of Ossory and will continue to be until restrictions are lifted. The current regulations allow for the each family who request a Catholic funeral to have a funeral Mass and burial for their loved one including those who die from the virus. There is no need for the deceased to be brought straight to the cemetery from the hospital or funeral home for burial, as has happened in some situations. However Funeral Masses and burials are restricted to ten people & social distancing is always required. These restrictions particularly on numbers attending can be very traumatic for families, yet they are there and we must respect them in the interest of the lives of others.

It is important to pay tribute and to compliment all the families who have celebrated funerals in our parishes recently and observed all the restrictions faithfully. Your cooperation at such a difficult time for you is a wonderful example of solidarity and care for the community even as you grieve. Thank You. A word of thanks to our local undertakers & gravediggers who are looking after families with such sensitivity and care at this time also. It is painful to have to observe these restrictions but we do so in the hope that one day soon we will be able to bid farewell to our loved ones as we have always been able to do. May all our dead rest in peace.

Respecting our Cemetery and our Dead



Ferrybank Parish is blessed to have such a beautiful parish cemetery where families lay their dead to rest and where they can come to spend time and remember them. The condition of the cemetery is testament to the wonderful work of past priests, parishioners and those who maintain it. Unfortunately in recent times a carelessness has set in as some dump flowers and wreaths and other items

indiscriminately. The cemetery has also witnessed some anti social behaviour in recent times and there is a constant fear that this might result in injury to a young person or to damage to graves. People have also been walking dogs in the cemetery while failing to respect graves and clean up after their animals. Security of the cemetery is constantly under review and measures may have to be taken to ensure that the graves of your loved ones are kept safe and that young people do not come to harm as a result of anti social behaviour or gatherings in the cemetery. In the near future updated regulations governing the cemetery will be published.
