Dear friends,

this weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension. The traditional image of Jesus being taken up beyond the clouds into heaven points to a new reality for the disciples of Jesus then and now. The resurrection had given the first disciples new hope. They experienced him as alive and present with them. Now however they had to let go of a familiar way of experiencing Christ and embrace a new way of discipleship. Jesus had brought them ever closer to the mystery of God's Love. Now they were commissioned to bring people ever closer to Jesus and to the mystery of God's Love. In the first reading this weekend from the Acts of the Apostles we hear; 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.

The new mission given to the disciples was not going to be achieved by standing around looking into the sky. Their mission was to have their feet on the ground, and with the help of the Holy Spirit to till the ground, to plough the hearts of women and men with the Good News of Jesus Christ so that the seeds of faith, hope and love could take root in their lives and communities. In this way Jesus would come back again and again in the same way as they had known him - bringing peace, mercy, hope & new life.

In these days of Covid - 19 is it possible that we too are being invited to let go of familiar ways of celebrating our faith in Jesus and to embrace new ways of doing so? It is never the mission of the church to stand around looking into the sky dreaming sentimentally of the past or fearfully avoiding present and future realities. It is our mission to have our feet on the ground, our gaze on Christ and our trust in the Holy Spirit. So in these days, as we approach the feast of Pentecost let us ask that same Spirit to lead us to new and exciting ways of communicating the Good News of Jesus Christ as we prepare to embrace the 'new normal'.

During the coming week we will be contacting some of our Ministers of the Word to continue their ministry of reading the Word of God at Mass.

Plans are well under way for a new website for our two parishes and we hope to be up and running in a few weeks.

This weekend we are delighted to gather via facebook live stream with parents and children who would have been celebrating First Communion this weekend in Slieverue. Families will be remembered in a special way at our Saturday evening Mass at 6 pm.

A big thank you to the staff of our schools OLGC Girls & St Mary's Boys & Abbey Community College who are doing such great work looking after their students, staff and families at this time.



The 54th World Day of Social Communications is celebrated today, 24th May – the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. Pope Francis has chosen to reflect on the theme of storytelling in his message this year. In the intro to his message on the theme "That you may tell your children and grandchildren" (Ex 10:2) Life becomes history", the Holy Father says, "I would like to devote this year's Message

to the theme of storytelling, because I believe that, so as not to lose our bearings, we need to make our own the truth contained in good stories. Stories that build up, not tear down; stories that help us rediscover our roots and the strength needed to move forward together. Amid the cacophony of voices and messages that surround us, we need a human story that can speak of ourselves and of the beauty all around us. A narrative that can regard our world and its happenings with a tender gaze. A narrative that can tell us that we are part of a living and interconnected tapestry. A narrative that can reveal the interweaving of the threads which connect us to one another."
