The Walk to Emmaus...

This weekend our gospel story is the familiar 'Road to Emmaus or the Walk to Emmaus. It's basically a story about two followers of Jesus who are traumatised by his recent suffering and death and are running away. However what happens as they make the journey and who they meet as they walk along is what changes everything. In our Christian Tradition the walk or the journey has always been as important as the destination. In fact what happens along the 'way' quite often determines the destination. `in other words setting out on the journey has always been an act of faith.

This is best seen in the Christian tradition of pilgrimage. For centuries Christians have undertaken pilgrimages or long 'spiritual' walks to renew their encounter with Christ. In our own country there are several pilgrim paths and indeed throughout Europe too - one of the most popular nowadays being the 'Camino' or pilgrimage to the tomb of St James in Santiago de Compostela.



There is a film called 'The Way' with Martin Sheen which tells the story of his characters experience on the Camino. You may have watched it or have it in your DVD collection. If not, it is well worth a watch. You may be able to download it or if you want to borrow it feel free to give me a call. You will see that like our friends on the road to Emmaus whose lives

are transformed by their encounter with the risen Lord so our lives can be transformed by him on the pilgrimage of life. The most important thing to bring on a pilgrimage is not your back pack or money or even a good pair of walking shoes (although they may be of help!) but a heart open to God and the ears of your soul tuned in to listen to the One who speaks through the winding road, the sometimes rugged conditions, and people you meet along the way.

These days we may not be able to make pilgrimage past 2km or maybe even at all. However we don't have to go anywhere. Each day is a pilgrim path, your back garden or indeed inside your own home can become the place of encounter with God, it can be the smooth path bathed in sunshine or the rough road, all uphill shadowed by clouds of darkness. Either way it is where you begin to realise that someone is walking beside you with every step. He wants you to Trust Him so that you may have hope - Trust & Hope even if you are not sure where the road is leading you. Life is a pilgrimage and as the two followers of Jesus found out Emmaus is not a destination but the place where we discover that we are not alone & we have been given the gifts needed to continue the journey.

News Update

During the week First Communion celebrations in our parishes were put on hold until further notice. This is disappointing for families yet the uncertainty could not continue. Parents were seeking clarity and for better or worse that is what we now have. What we are not clear about is when all our Confirmations and Communions will be rescheduled. That is another days work! Bishop Farrell sent a letter to all parents of Confirmation and First Communion Parents during the past week in which he acknowledged that Confirmation and Communion were rightly on hold for the moment but also invited us to have hope that these days will be celebrated again. We look forward to that day. In the meantime we await the 5th of May when hopefully a clearer path may open up before us. Coincidentally the 5th May is the feast of Blessed Edmund Rice, honoured in Ossory and Waterford and Lismore! Let us pray through his intercession for all who are suffering from the Corona Virus, those who died from it, their families and all who are working to bring an end to the pandemic. Let us pray too for all families, for our elderly and those living alone or in nursing homes, for those caring for loved ones at home, for those who are afraid, for our children and young people. Let us remember our teachers who are working away providing material for children to work on even as they are away from school. Let us pray for those charged with making decisions about the future. Blessed Edmund Rice pray for us.
